New Indiana Law Affects Students

GCHS hallways and classrooms will look different next year after the passing of Senate Bill 185, which requires each school corporation and charter school to (1) adopt and implement a wireless communication device policy that governs student use of a wireless communication device and (2) publish the policy on the school corporation's or charter school's website. This law applies to all cell phones, tablets, laptops, or gaming devices except for educational purposes and/or medical emergencies.

A similar law was passed in Florida last year, and it was said to heavily reduce distractions in the classroom, cut down on bullying through social media, and encourage more in-person interaction. "The new law regarding cell phones is interesting. We already had a similar policy in place at Greenfield-Central, but we amended a few things to make sure we were following the letter of the law." Mr. Jason Cary, principal at Greenfield-Central High School, said. He also believes it will be a group effort to help enforce this new law, and it will take the whole principal staff, teachers, and students to make it the best learning environment for all high school students.

Over the summer, school officials will be working to implement this new law. Whether this will have a positive outcome for GCHS, only time will tell.

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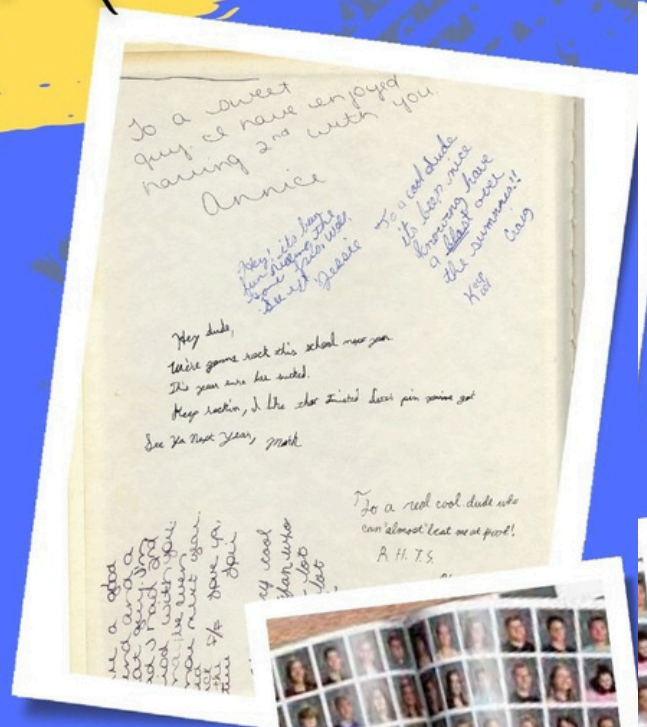
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
